January Plate Collection

C.A.M.P. YDP in Paterson is the recipient of 50% of the January plate collection. In a time when worthy non-profit organizations are struggling, C.A.M.P. needs your support more than ever.

C.A.M.P. YDP is an afterschool program, preschool program, and summer program for children on the northside of Paterson, about 10 miles from Ridgewood. Most of these kids are children of color. Many of them come from single parent households. Most are living at, or below, the poverty line. Parents are working, but struggling to buy food and pay rent, which leaves their children without the resources (babysitters, sports programs, tutors, summer camp...) that many of our kids take for granted.

The board recently revamped C.A.M.P.'s mission and vision statements and is working hard to get the programming in line with them. They believe that the children and families deserve the best education and should have experiences and opportunities to excel. USR's continued support will help them to achieve this goal.

C.A.M.P. aims to provide a safe after school experience with guided homework help, a full day preschool for children who are not accepted to the public preschool, and enriching experiences as part of a summer program. All of these are resources that the C.A.M.P. parents cannot afford to provide.

They are currently serving over 100 students, an increase from last year, providing a safe-haven, meals, early learning opportunities and homework help. They are on track for goal of reaching our license capacity of 129 children.

During the summer, C.A.M.P. provides educational and recreational field trips. They plan to offer scholar-ships to needy families in the summer to pay for their field trips. It is their goal to make sure every child attends the trips regardless of the family's financial situation. C.A.M.P. summer fees are \$100.

Unitarian Society of Ridgewood has a long history with C.A.M.P. YDP. Generations of volunteers beginning in the 1970s and continuing with Judith Brauburger and Jan Bottcher assisting afterschool program. Citizens for Swimming supported by USR provides lessons and fun at Graydon Pool during the summer.

Your donations in the January plate collection will continue this tradition of support for our neighbors in Paterson.

For Family Promise

Our next volunteer opportunity for Family Promise is in March. Family Promise is a shelter for homeless families. The director, Kate Duggan, recently told me about how this program changes lives over generations. A client in the program years ago had 3 children, who were informed about Ramapo College and helped to apply. The family had never thought about higher education. They all went, they all graduated, and they are all employed at excellent jobs now. The program tries to address and remedy the causes of homelessness, not just the immediate needs. Lame Duck Session Yields Big Wins for UU/Human Values

Dear Ira,

Frequently, Lame Duck sessions (that chaotic time period right before the end of one 2-yr. legislative session and the beginning of the next) yield long-awaited outcomes...and this lame duck session has been no exception!

We are thrilled to announce that through your calls, emails and pounding the pavement, several critical pieces of legislation have at long last PASSED that UU FaithAction (and for that matter, UULMNJ) has championed over the past years:

- Voter Expansion for Parolees and Probationers, allowing an additional 83,000 New Jerseyans to exercise their right to vote. With over half of those currently in the parole/probation system African-Americans (despite being only 15% of the overall population) NJ was in the unenviable position of currently denying voting rights to more African-Americans than were denied prior to passage of the 15th Amendment.
- Driver's Licenses for Those with Limited Documentation, S-3229/A-4743 (for a good article covering the many issues and state politics involved, as well as those Dems and Republicans who voted "No," I recommend this NJ Spotlight article).
- S761, the "Earn Your Way Out Act," would automatically grant parole to non-violent and non-sex offenders on their first eligibility date if they do not break any serious rules or laws while in prison and have completed rehabilitation programs and the crime victims have been notified.
- Several **environmental bills** advanced, including bills affecting lead in the water and electric vehicles.
- The Dignity Act for Incarcerated Parents and Title X restoration of funding, both long supported by our *Reproductive* and *Criminal Justice Reform Task Forces*, also passed allowing parents increased rights to visitation and providing emergency funding for clinics who do not comply with the Trump Administration's abortion policy (more on the latter in a good article here).

Marijuana legalization, long a hot political potato in the legislature, has been cleared by votes in both
houses to appear on next year's November ballot. Some of the decriminalization issues that we have
worked hard to include in any legalization measures remain to be implemented legislatively but the Expungement measure for minor drug violations passed both houses and the Governor has indicated he
would sign.

Though for each of the above there remains one final hurdle--Gov. Murphy's signature--every indication from his staffers and office is that he will sign each of them.

It was exciting to be with so many people who care so passionately about other New Jersyans, regardless of their race, orientation, gender, or status!



The photo above shows how close I was able to get to the Assembly Visitor's Gallery up until the vital License vote, when I was able to squeeze in to cheer (very briefly--decorum dictates a mostly silent Visitor's Gallery) and hug other activists--and to represent for UUs across the state.

We couldn't ask for better Christmas and Hanukkah presents...justice, hope, expanding the circle of dignity and love here in the Garden State. Thanks to each of you who plug away, during good times and bad, with deep faith and an activist's heart. A UU heart, I would call it.


