January Plate Collections

C.A.M.P. YDP in Paterson is the recipient of 50% of the January plate collections.

In a time when worthy non profit organizations are struggling, C.A.M.P. needs your support more than ever.

C.A.M.P. YDP is an afterschool program, preschool program, and summer program for children on the northside of Paterson, about 10 miles from Ridgewood. Most of these kids are children of color. Many of them come from single parent households. Most are living at, or below, the poverty line. Parents are working, but struggling to buy food and pay rent, which leaves their children without the resources (babysitters, sports programs, tutors, summer camp...) that many of our kids take for granted.

C.A.M.P. aims to provide a safe after school experience with guided homework help, a full day preschool for children who are not accepted to the public preschool, and enriching experiences as part of a summer program. All of these are resources that the C.A.M.P. parents cannot afford to provide.

Unitarian Society of Ridgewood has a long history with C.A.M.P. YDP. Generations of volunteers beginning in the 1970s with Betty Velonis and others, continuing onto Barbara Goldberg, Sue and John Handley, Brietta Savoie and now Mike Patterson, Ira Mendelsberg, Judith Brauburger, and Jan Bottcher have assisted in the afterschool program. Citizens for Swimming, supported by USR, provides lessons and fun at Graydon Pool during the summer.

Your donations in the January plate collection will continue this tradition of support for our neighbors in Paterson.

John Lindsay-Poland

After the poetry service on **December**, **30**, **2018**, stay to hear John Lindsay-Poland (son of our Helen Lindsay), Healing Justice Associate at the American Friends Service Committee and author of <u>Emperors in the Jungle: The Hidden History of the U.S. in Panama</u>, published by Duke University Press, discuss his newest book *Plan Columbia*.

For more than fifty years, the United States supported the Colombian military in a war that cost over 200,000 lives. During a single period of heightened U.S. assistance known as Plan Colombia, the Colombian military killed more than 5,000 civilians. In *Plan Colombia* John Lindsay-Poland narrates a 2005 massacre in the San José de Apartadó Peace Community and the subsequent investigation, official cover-up, and response from the international community. He examines how the multibillion-dollar U.S. military aid and official indifference contributed to the Colombian military's atrocities. Drawing on his human rights activism and interviews with military officers, community members, and human rights defenders, Lindsay-Poland describes grassroots initiatives in Colombia and the United States that resisted militarized policy and created alternatives to war. Although they had few resources, these initiatives offered models for constructing just and peaceful relationships between the United States and other nations. Yet, despite the civilian death toll and documented atrocities, Washington, DC, considered Plan Colombia's counterinsurgency campaign to be so successful that it became the dominant blueprint for U.S. military intervention around the world.

Title IX Changes

The Department of Education under Betsy DeVos has proposed a significant roll-back to protections for sexual harrasment and assault victims under Title IX. The Department has made public that these changes came about after meeting with mens' rights groups, advocates and school institutions.

The proposed changes include narrowing the definition of sexual harassment and limiting where and how schools respond to claims of harassment. Certainly these changes would lead to less reporting and also less school-led investigations.

The good news is that the Public can make meaningful comments opposing these changes which will be taken into consideration before changes go into effect next year. Deadline to comment is January 28, 2019.

Organizations like End Rape on Campus and Know Your IX have published comment guides, with more information for individuals and/or organizations who are writing comments to support Title IX, including a template, see below.

The Third Annual Women's March Solidarity, Power, Progress Saturday, January 19, 2019

The <u>first Women's March on New Jersey</u> attracted about 7,500 marchers to Trenton the day after President Donald Trump's inauguration. About 15,000 people <u>packed Morristown Green</u> in January for the 2018 Women's March on New Jersey.

Now, organizers are planning to march for a third time.

The 2019 Women's March on New Jersey <u>will be held in Trenton</u> on **January 19th**, organizers have announced. The 11 a.m. march will begin at the State House Annex on West State Street and conclude on the steps of the War Memorial around 1 p.m.

"The organizers of the Women's March on New Jersey want women, here in our state, to rally together for something, not demonstrate against something," organizers said.

The New Jersey march is expected to be one of dozens of similar <u>women's marches held around the country January 19</u>. The largest event is expected to be the <u>Women's March on Washington</u>, which is being organized by the national women's march organization. Sister marches will be held in cities around the nation, including large marches in New York and Philadelphia.

NNJSC Looking for Host Family

The Northern New Jersey Sanctuary Coalition is looking for a volunteer host family, with at least one Spanish-speaking member, for a 24 year-old Salvadoran mother and her 4 year old son, M. B, whose hometown is essentially controlled by gangs, was raped in 2014 by a high-ranking member of a gang and became pregnant with M. Earlier this year, M's father, who is currently incarcerated in El Salvador, threatened B that she had to bring M to visit him in jail or else he would have M kidnapped and kill B. With no choice but to flee from her home country, B embarked on the dangerous journey from El Salvador to the U.S. border with her son M. At the border, B and M declared themselves as seeking asylum. They were taken into custody by immigration officials, and then separated for about six weeks. They were reunited in July, and B is trying to build a safe life for herself and M here in the U.S. If you have questions or know anyone who might be interested in helping, please see our website, nnjsanctuary.org and contact Dr. Elizabeth Ames, president of the NNJSC.


