The call to witness and act for justice in our society and in the world is clear. Join us in Kansas City as we dive deeply into questions of mission for our Unitarian Universalist Association, for our congregations and communities, and for each of us as individuals.

#### **SUCCESS on Gun Violence Prevention Bills!**

Thank you to everyone who participated in this week's CALL TO ACTION on Gun Violence Prevention (GVP)!

On May 21, the NJ Senate Appropriations Committee passed six of the seven GVP bills before it. It sent the 7<sup>th</sup> – the Extreme Risk Protection Order (ERPO) bill -- back to committee for further discussion and amendment.

There will be a full Senate vote next month and it is expected that Governor Murphy will sign the bills into law by the end of June.

**June 1st** is National WEAR ORANGE Day. Orange is the color of the gun violence prevention movement and we'll be wearing orange on June 1<sup>st</sup> and throughout June to honor victims of gun violence. We will be discussing programming for 2018-19. There are many reproductive justice issues that the committee has been watching including but not limited to the following: maternal/infant mortality rates, especially for people of color and possible direction to legislate change in NJ; issues for women in Edna Mahan Correctional Facility for Women including sexual assault by corrections officers and current legislative remedies and use of shackles during pregnancy, labor and delivery; menstrual products for the poor, homeless and in schools. In addition, in this political climate there is a strong need to be aware of new Supreme Court rulings, administration directives. Currently Title X funds are being threatened for Planned Parenthood and other clinics that offer full range reproductive health. There is a strong need for advocacy. We are also exploring events to discuss population control and eugenics. Please join us!
