New Jersey Unitarian's trip to Transylvania

The trip to Transylvania, was organized by the UU Partner Church Council Pilgrimage Service (UUPCCP). It also included a short visit to the Czech Republic and a 2-week road trip to several historic sites in Romania.

In Prague, we attended a Sunday service with the Unitarian congregation with whom we shared a meal and PowerPoint presentations, introducing the different congregations represented in our group (Paramus, Ridgewood, Montclair, Palisades, Morristown, and Mississauga).

The itinerary and visits in Transylvania and Wallachia, the two Romanian provinces that we toured, provided a new understanding of the historical roots of the Unitarian faith, going back to the Unitarian Reformation which started in the year 1565 with the historic sermon of David Ferenc (Francis David), in Cluj/Kolozsvar.

The "golden age" of the religious freedom, introduced by the Unitarian principles proclaimed in 1565, was followed by long centuries of hard compromises. This is well illustrated in the symbol adorning several of the historic places that were visited. There are four distinct features to the symbol: a dove, a serpent, a mountain and a golden crown. The dove symbolizes peace; the serpent symbolizes wisdom. It is inspired by a passage from Matthew's Gospel. chapter 10 v 16. "Behold I am sending you forward as sheep in the midst of wolves. Therefore be wise as serpents and innocent as doves." There is also a golden crown at the top of the Transylvanian symbol. This is the crown of the only Unitarian king in history, John Sigismund, who, by signing "The Edit of Toleration" in Torda in 1568, recognized and supported the Unitarian Reformation.


On **Sunday**, Rev Sarah Lenzi will round out the weekend with a service on topic.

GET OUT THE VOTE

The Social Responsibilities Council is committed to a GOTV campaign between now and the election on **Tuesday, November 5, 2019.** The SRC table will have Applications to register to vote and Applications to Vote by Mail at the SRC table all fall. If you are registered, think about a neighbor, friend or family member who may not be registered. You can bring them an application.

As we all know, one of the major obligations of citizenship is to vote. You must be 18 years old to vote. You can register when you are 17 years old if you will be 18 on voting day. You must also be a resident of the county for at least 30 days before the election. The deadline to register to vote for the November election is **Tuesday, October 15, 2019.**

You can submit an Application to Vote by Mail Ballot (formerly called Absentee Ballot). The last day to apply for a Vote by Mail ballot by mail for the General Election is **Tuesday**, **October 29**, **2019**. It must be received in the County Clerk's office 7 days prior to election.

A voter can also apply in person to the county Clerk until 3:00 p.m. on **Monday, November 4**, the day before election. The County Clerk's office will also be open from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on **Saturday, November 2** to vote in person by Mail in Ballot for the November election. Link for this application is:

Legislation was recently passed so that if you voted by mail in recent elections, you will get a ballot In the mail. If you received one, you can opt out, but will be asked to fill out a provisional ballot at your polling place. See article about this new law:
